Doyon Foundation Seeks Candidates for Board of Directors

Doyon Foundation is seeking candidates for its board of directors. One seat, open to any Doyon, Limited shareholder, will be up for election this October. The term is for three years, expiring in 2011. The election will take place at Doyon Foundation's annual membership meeting on October 18, 2008 in the third-floor board room at 1 Doyon Place in Fairbanks. The time is to be determined.

Qualifications

Candidates seeking election to the Doyon Foundation board must be:

- A Doyon shareholder.
- 18 years of age or older.
- Knowledgeable about private foundation management and higher education.
- Familiar with the Foundation's strategic plan, long-term vision and goals, and updated mission and purpose, which are detailed below.
- Committed to spending up to 200 hours a year carrying out the duties of a board member; this includes attending quarterly board meetings, serving on two board committees on a volunteer basis, completing work outside of meetings, representing the Foundation at various events, and speaking on behalf of the Foundation at events, if asked.

Important Notice

Please note that, under federal laws governing private foundations, family members of Doyon Foundation board members are not eligible to receive a Doyon Foundation basic or competitive scholarship during their term on the board. Family members are defined as the board members' spouse, ancestors, children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren and the spouses of children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Current Doyon Foundation scholarship recipients are also not eligible to serve on the board.

Responsibilities/Job Description

The duties of a Doyon Foundation board member include:

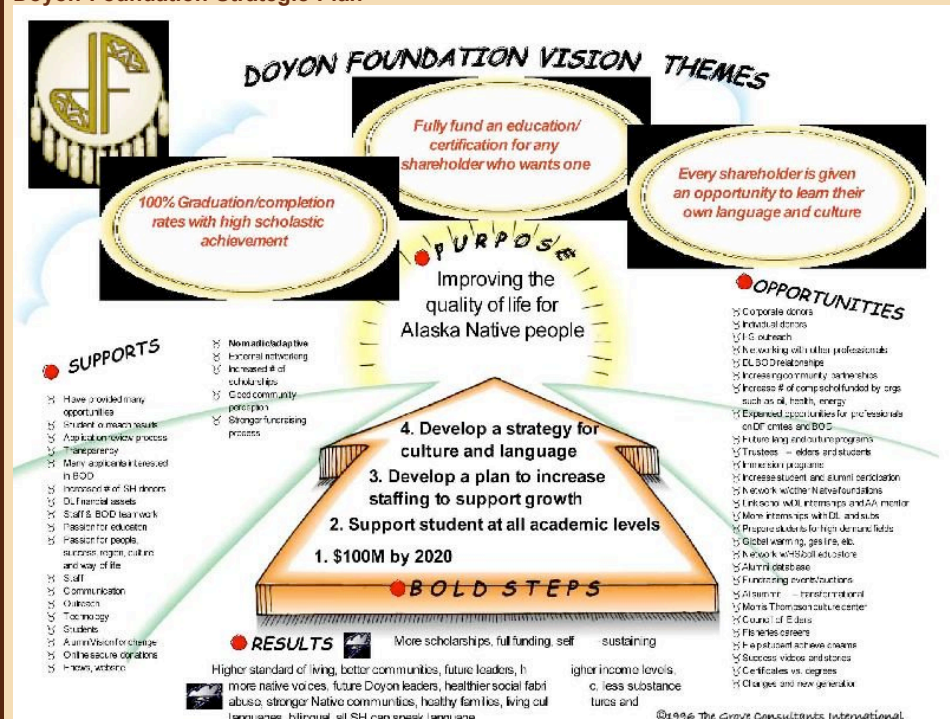
- Contribute skills that help the Foundation make progress on its strategic plan, which is detailed below.
- Consistently work toward and produce results related to the Foundation's long-term goals, which include developing a strategy for culture and language, developing a plan to increase staffing to support growth, supporting students at all academic levels, and raising \$100 million by 2020.
- Define and oversee the mission of the Foundation and keep it relevant to the needs of Doyon shareholders and their descendents.

- Approve programs and services, and monitor their effectiveness.
- Provide strategic guidance to the Foundation and its executive director.
- Ensure financial solvency and help raise resources.
- Select, support and evaluate the executive director.
- Ensure continuous board improvement.
- Attend quarterly meetings in Fairbanks, as well as any special meetings called.
- Serve on two board committees and possibly chair one committee. Committees include Finance/Investment, Development, and Governance.
- Participate in at least one board training event.
- Demonstrate willingness to take on other duties and assignments, as needed.
- Represent and, if asked, speak on behalf of Doyon Foundation at various events.

Time Commitment

To successfully complete the duties detailed above, it is estimated that board members will spend 50 - 200 hours per year on board meetings and committee work, which includes work outside of meetings.

Clarification on Mail Back Cards

As mentioned in the last e-newsletter, Doyon Foundation will not be sending the yellow "mail back" cards to competitive and basic scholarship recipients this year. Instead, all scholarship recipients will need to re-apply for their spring 2009 funding using the online or paper application by the November 15 deadline. This is also the deadline for basic scholarship recipients to apply for funding for the spring 2009 semester.

Doyon Foundation encourages all students to apply online, as it is quick, easy and information is archived, so students will not have to fill out the same information each semester. To get started, students without an online account should first create one at www.doyonfoundation.com/CreateAccount.aspx. This should be done as soon as possible, as it takes one - three days to verify the request.

High School Students Eligible for Doyon Foundation Scholarships

Through Doyon Foundation's Advanced College Credit program, high school students taking college classes are eligible for part-time scholarships, if their school district does not pay for classes. Students may receive scholarships covering the cost of their class, up to \$400.

To apply, students should complete a basic scholarship application, which may be found at www.doyonfoundation.com/static/files/ScholarshipApplicationForm.pdf. If the student is under 18, a parent must sign the waiver form, found on page two of the application. Students must also provide proof of enrollment, including a class description, course cost and credits received, as well as copies of their official high school transcripts.

While there are no set deadlines for this program, students should submit applications close to the college student scholarship application deadlines, which are March 15 for the summer semester, April 15 for the fall semester, and November 15 for the spring semester.

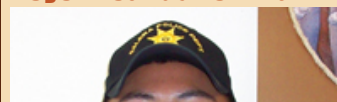

Doyon Foundation Alumnus Profile: Michael Ervin



Earlier this summer, Doyon Foundation alumnus Michael Ervin was hired as the second full-time officer with the Galena Police Department, doubling the size of the department.



Prior to becoming a police officer, Ervin, originally from Northway/Tok, worked as a supervisor with Doyon Security, was a Kansas Correctional Officer, and completed a tour of duty in Iraq with the Alaska Army National Guard.

"Education is important because it's hard to have a successful career without an education. If I didn't have the education, I wouldn't have done well in the police academy and be where I'm at today," said Ervin, who earned his GED, completed one year of college, and plans on getting a degree

in criminal justice.

Ervin said he faced a lot of challenges in school, but overcame them by not giving up. Encouragement from friends and family members, and scholarships from Doyon Foundation also helped him keep going.

"Because of the scholarship I received from Doyon, I was able to go to the police academy. I'm very thankful that I am a part of a corporation like Doyon," he said.

Ervin encouraged other students to "stay in school, get the education you need, be successful in your career, and never quit. Life is tough, but you have to put one foot in front of the other and keep going."

Ervin is the son of Betty Didricksen and the late Justin Ervin, and the grandson of Oscar Jimmie and the late Hellen Jimmie.

Tips for Success

Are you spending enough time studying for your classes? Spending the right amount of time preparing for your classes is key to your academic success! Use this handy guide to figure out how much time you should be allocating for your studies:

- For a **3-credit course**, you should spend at least **6 hours per week** on homework/studying.
- For a **4-credit course**, you should spend at least **8 hours per week** on homework/studying.
- For a **5-credit course** you should spend at least **10 hours per week** on homework/studying.
- If you're taking **12 credits**, plan to spend **24 hours per week** on homework/studying.
- If you're taking **15 credits**, plan to spend **30 hours per week** on homework/studying.
- If you're taking **18 credits**, plan to spend **36 hours per week** on homework/studying.

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
