Doyon Foundation Student Selected as Gates Millennium Scholar

Doyon Foundation student Sigourney Walker recently became one of 1,000 students from across the entire country to be selected for the 2008 - 2009 Gates Millennium Scholars (GMS) award, a prestigious award given to outstanding, low-income, minority students.

The GMS program is much more than just a scholarship - the program offers funding for undergraduate degrees in any discipline, as well as renewable awards for maintaining satisfactory academic progress; graduate school funding in the areas of education, engineering, library science, mathematics, public health and sciences; and leadership development programs.

"Essentially, being a Gates Scholar means you are funded through your bachelor's degree and even graduate school. It is an amazing opportunity to continue my education without facing significant financial barriers," said Walker, who is the daughter of Hugh and Susan Walker of Fairbanks, and the granddaughter of Irene and the late James Walker from Holy Cross, and Betty and Mike Meyers from Reno, Nev.

Walker, a 2007 graduate of West Valley High School, is currently attending the University of Alaska Fairbanks (UAF), where she is pursuing a degree in biochemistry. After graduating in 2011, Walker said she hopes to go on to medical or graduate school.

"I'd love to work in a hospital one day. There are many wonderful opportunities and many professions to choose from in that arena," she said.

In addition to her studies, Walker also plays the harp, participates in the UAF

Leadership Program, and is part of a student-led TV production called "Diversity Matters," which airs every Saturday at 2:30 p.m. on Channel 7 in Fairbanks. During high school, Walker participated in band and gymnastics and took advanced placement (AP) classes - experiences that helped her through the GMS award's extensive application process, which called for numerous essays and letters of recommendation.

"Take your time," Walker advised other students interested in applying for GMS. "Filling out the form online is nice because you can save it and return periodically to add and edit. For your letters, find people who are well-acquainted with your skills and abilities. Most of all, let your application reflect yourself and how proud you are of your accomplishments!"

Walker recently shared some of her insights with students when she joined Doris Miller, Doyon Foundation's scholarship program manager, in addressing youth delegates at the Tanana Chiefs Conference Youth Convention. The Foundation thanks Walker for her assistance and participation.



In addition to the GMS award, Walker is also a Doyon Foundation 2007 - 2008 competitive scholarship recipient.

"The Foundation encourages students and helps them achieve their academic and vocational dreams. I think it is very important for Alaska Native students to have a bridge to join their cultural roots and educational goals together," she said. "Knowing that the corporation believes in me and supports my education goals feels great!"

Troth Yeddha' Park Blessed at UAF



The Minto Dancers performed at the blessing and dedication for the newly named Troth Yeddha' Park at UAF in late February.

On February 29, a blessing and dedication was held for the newly named Troth Yeddha' Park, which is located near the Paul Reichardt Building and the UA Museum at the University of Alaska Fairbanks (UAF).

The naming of the park is significant, as the land now occupied by the UAF campus was called Troth Yeddha' ("wild potato") by the Tanana Athabascans, who once used the area to pick troth and as a meeting place.

According to the UAF Rural Students Services Web site, the late Chief Peter John of Tanana Chiefs Conference said, "When they learned this place would be used for a school, they came here one last time to decide what they should do. They decided that the school would be good and would carry on a very similar traditional use of this hill (a place where good thinking and working together would happen). They placed an eagle feather on a pole. This was to let all the people know that the Dena would no longer be using the ridge for a meeting place or to pick wild potatoes. They were also giving a blessing so their grandchildren would be part of the new school."

The park blessing included a reading of the proclamation, a reading of the late Chief Peter John's Troth Yeddha' history, a blessing by Rev. Anna Frank, and a performance by the Minto Singers. The event was organized by the UAF Chancellor's Advisory Committee on Native Education, which Doyon Foundation is a member of.
