### **Doyon Foundation Student Profile: Mick Aney**



Doyon Foundation student Mick Aney is one of several wonderful examples of students who are benefiting from the Morris Thompson Scholarship Fund, which is named in honor of the late Morris Thompson, who served as the



president/CEO of Doyon, Limited from 1985 until his passing in 2000. Each year, the fund provides scholarships to hard-working, higher education students studying business management and leadership.

"Knowing that the Morris Thompson scholarship is merit-based, I take it as a personal compliment on my achievements in school. Being rewarded with this scholarship fortifies the belief I have in myself that I do have the potential to be successful," said Aney, a 2007 - 2008 Morris Thompson Committee's Choice scholarship recipient.

Aney, who is from Moses Lake, Wash., is currently pursuing a degree in accounting from Washington State University. After graduating in May 2010, Aney said he plans to apply for the master's of accounting program, then sit for the certified public accountant (CPA) exam. Ultimately, he said he would like to work for one of the "big four" accounting firms.

In addition to his schooling, Aney is also involved with the accounting club, plays intramural soccer and flag football, and is in the process of starting his own company, called MoTown Tables.

His education and activities have helped him earn several honors, including the Philip and Steven Cozier Business Scholarship; Future Cougars of Color Scholarship; University Achievement Award; and Academic Achievement/Diversity Award. In addition to these, Aney has also received other awards and scholarships, including support from Doyon Foundation.

"The support I have received from the Doyon Foundation has taken a large load off my shoulders. It is hard enough studying and getting good grades. Not having to stress as much about my finances is a great relief," Aney said.

When it comes to advice for other students, Aney had a few words to share.

## Tips for Student Success

Getting ready to graduate? While requirements differ between schools, here are some general tips to help you make sure you've taken care of all the little details you need to complete before you collect your diploma.

1. Make sure you're formally admitted into your degree or certificate program. If you don't know if you're formally admitted or not, check with the admissions office or your academic advisor.
2. Do an initial degree check. The next step is to meet with your academic advisor to go over your classes and make sure you have met, or will meet, all the requirements to graduate.
3. Attend your school's graduation fair, if held on your campus. Order your cap, gown, invitations, class ring and other "graduation gear" in plenty of time before the commencement ceremony.
4. Complete the graduation application and submit it by the deadline. You'll usually need to pay a small graduation application fee, as well.
5. Review your official degree audit. This will usually be a letter you'll receive from the university showing a breakdown of your graduation requirements and outlining any outstanding requirements. If there is something wrong or unexpected on your audit, contact your academic advisor immediately.
6. Celebrate! Proudly attend your university's commencement ceremony, then enjoy your newfound status as a graduate!
7. Update your address. If you're moving, make sure your school has

your new mailing address, so they can remain in contact with you.  
8. Consider joining the university's alumni association, as well as the Doyon Foundation Alumni Association!
